- 3. Explain the drive for settlement of the frontier during the mid-seventeenth century and the tensions that arose from this settlement
- What were the unifying issues for colonists against Britain in the mid-eighteenth century? Consider social, economic, and 4. political issues. What arguments were used to justify these actions?
- 5. How did colonial leaders and average civilians mobilize for the Patriot movement? How effective were these methods?
